

During a year marked by distress, anxiety and uncertainty the world over, children are uniquely impacted. Confused and worried by new rules, restrictions and the disruption of their routines, it's no surprise that many have been asking: *"Is Christmas cancelled this year?"*



But Kara's* whispered question is even more poignant: "Aren't we going to have Christmas this year - again?"

That's because the shy eight-year-old is used to missing out on the joy, excitement and a child's wonder of Christmas. Not because of a pandemic, but because the holiday season at her house triggers even more arguing, violence, pain, tears and despair than usual.

It's the reality for far too many children like Kara who are living with domestic abuse. Cherished traditions and happy celebrations give way to fear and unease. And in stark contrast to the

cheerful decorations and bright twinkling lights, women and their children in our communities face futures that are dark, bleak and seemingly hopeless.

This past year was especially scary and stressful for women, children and adolescents impacted by domestic abuse and/or homelessness. Health experts urged everyone to self-isolate and quarantine at home to slow the spread of COVID-19. But for women living with violent and abusive partners, staying at home meant they – and their children – were at even greater risk of harm.

That is why we never stopped offering our essential programs and services!

At a time when much of the world was stepping back and staying behind closed doors, our team stepped up. *We did not close, not for one minute,* but continued to provide our vital programs including shelter and 24/7 crisis services, knowing they were needed – perhaps more than at any other time. We offer:

- Safe haven in our 24/7 high security 21-bed shelter, Oxford County's ONLY year-round shelter.
- Effective, comprehensive community-based programs including counselling, transitional and court support to help women rebuild their lives and their families.
- Help when they call us on our 24-hour crisis/information/support line, available to all in the community.

Since opening our doors in 1974, we have provided protection, prevention and possibilities for more than 17,000 women, children and adolescents. We can only do this with help from YOU – and supporters like you – concerned, caring people who know that only by working together can we end the vicious cycle of domestic abuse in the communities of Oxford County.

Women like Jessica* who began seeing a different side of her boyfriend once he convinced her to move in with him. What she first took for attentiveness proved to be obsessive jealousy and a need to control her every move. Before long, insults and accusations were hurled at her daily and by the time the pandemic was declared and she was isolated at home even more after losing her job, the abuse had become physical and increasingly more violent. Trapped and terrified, Jessica somehow found the courage to reach out to DASO – a call she now believes saved her life.

And children like Kara and Tyler,* whose only wish for Christmas was that daddy and mommy would stop fighting. They didn't understand why they didn't have decorations and treats and fun, like

at their friends' houses. After a particularly terrifying night their mother Crystal* took Tyler and Kara to DASO. The family received protected shelter while the children began to heal from witnessing violence through our specialized children's counselling service, *Believe In Me.* DASO staff supported Crystal through the court system while we helped her find new housing for her and her children in Ingersoll.
